Curator's Corner: An Artist's Legacy

Once upon a time, from 1946 to 1957, West Rutland's downtown place to watch movies was the Joy Theater. In the mid-1990s, Glenn Campbell bought the building, and poured a concrete slab to flatten the angled floor. Where the floor was deepest, he created pits for receiving poured molten metal. It is here that Campbell Plaster and Iron turns small clay sculptures into towering statues for zoos and museums across the country). Right now, Glenn is casting huge whales' tails to be installed in Provincetown, Massachusetts.



Meanwhile, Dorset artist Arthur
Jones was losing his eyesight toward
the end of his life, and thus stopped
painting and made a plasticine
sculpture of his cat Toby. This was
Arthur's last finished work of art,
and it was donated to the Dorset Historical Society. Plasticine is not a
very stable compound, so I knew we
had to bake or cast it in order to preserve the piece. I soon found out
that plasticine and kilns do not get

along, so I called Glenn to see about casting the cat. He made a silicone mold, filled it with bronze, and finally added a chocolate patina, guaranteeing that Arthur's last work can be admired for generations to come.

This brings us to a commercial message. Because the mold has been made,

we can, if people are interested, create a limited edition of this sculpture carrying Arthur's distinctive signature. No more than twenty-five will be made, and sold for a yet-tobe-determined price. If you are at all interested, please let us know.




DHS Activities -IN- the Museum...

A Look Back at Marble Quarrying in Vermont





DHS recently received a series of photos from the 1930's showing marble being removed from Danby's underground Imperial Quarry and shipped off to processing mills.









Marble blocks are drawn from deep inside Dorset mountain on a railcar, then hoisted up to ground level by a derrick.





The blocks get transferred onto counter-balanced cars of an "inclined railway" that descend 1100+ vertical feet to a waiting train depot.
